Stakeholder Engagement

Senator Gershaw has an active School Council and utilizes annual assurance surveys as well as created our own survey that is given to all parents and students within our school community.

Parents and School Council

Parents completed the Alberta Assurance survey in February and a school developed survey in April. From the feedback of these results we develop school goals and bring them to the first School Council meeting in September for School Council feedback.

Teachers

Teachers analyze the results of surveys together developing school goals. Preliminary goals are established in May, that are further refined in School Improvement (SI) days prior to the beginning of the school year. School Plan is revisited during SI days throughout the school year for refinement.

Support Staff

Support staff are invited to analyze the results of surveys with teaching staff. Support staff provide further input in School Plan during School Improvement days in August and other staff meetings within the school year.

Students

Students at Senator Gershaw in Grades 4, 7, and 10 complete the Alberta Assurance Survey in February. All students receive a school developed survey in April. Results will be brought to student council in September with input into school goals and plan.

Community Groups

The School Plan will be posted on our website for community groups to read and provide feedback.

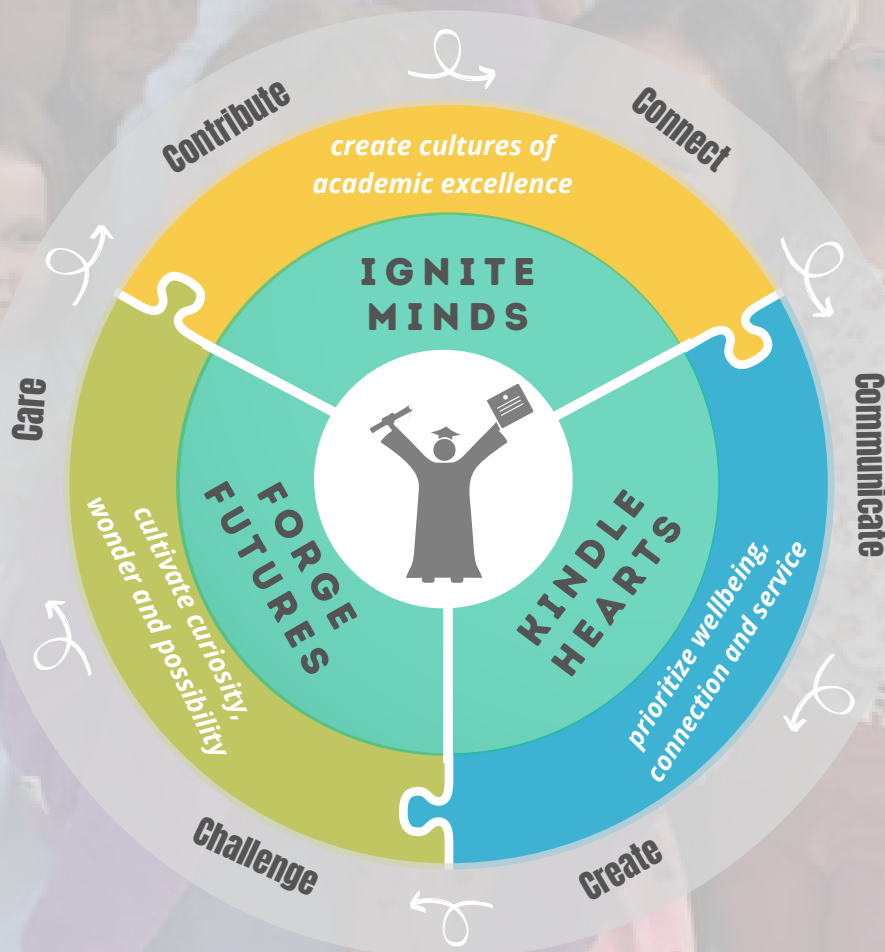

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

All students will feel connected to at least one adult in the school.

- Collaborative response model will be reincorporated to our school schedule to make sure no students "fall between the cracks" or go unnoticed.
- Utilize 2 X 10 strategy for student connection
- Wellness coach will continue to be utilized for Health classes within the school.
- Advisory focus will be on maintaining student connection, wellness check-ins, and strategies for successful physical and mental health.
- Every staff at the school will greet students at the door in the morning and dismiss students at the end of the day.

SCHOOL BASED PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- Student and parent surveys that will be taken annually.
- FSLW referral decrease.
- Decrease in habitual lates and absences.

PRPS GOAL 3: FORGE FUTURES

Background: Futures will be forged by cultivating wonder and possibilities.

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

- Classroom instruction will focus on applications of concepts to real world.
- Continue to develop agricultural programming that connects our students to industry partners and incorporates a greater percentage of the student body.
- Metacognition strategies through student led conferences and an exhibition of learning will be refined for students to communicate their learning appropriately and effectively.
- Communication life skills will be taught to students in Grades 7-12 to be effective in social norms.

- Students will be engaged in all courses through applicable contexts.
- Every teacher and every student will be involved in the planning and development of our exhibition of learning.

Education around the non-operational September 30th day will happen throughout the week of September 26-28. A school based approach to implementing the seven sacred teachings of first nations will be considered.

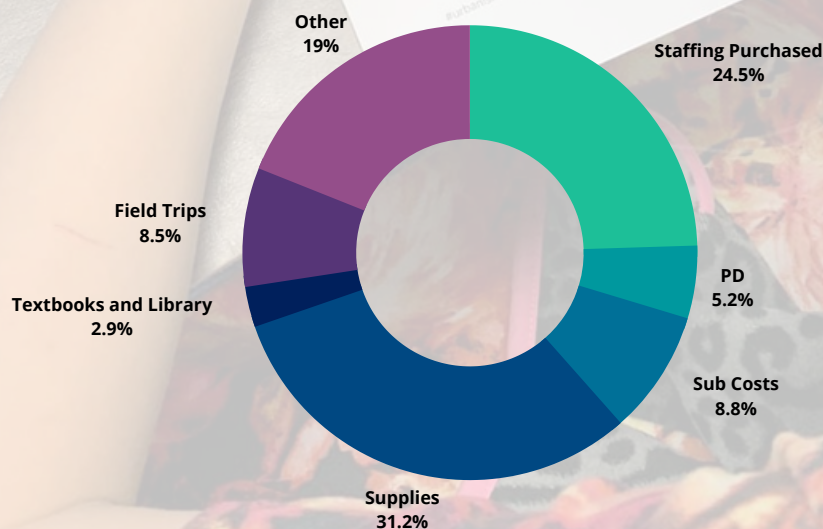
2022-2023 Budget Summary
